Your 2022 City of Olathe budget reflects priority-based decisions and is focused on long-term strategies to keep Olathe future-ready. The approved operating budget and 2022-2026 Capital Improvement Plan support resident priorities, contributing to Olathe's place as one of the nation's best cities.

Olathe staff is committed to maintaining highly-rated services and producing

great value for public tax dollars. The City of Olathe has one of the nation's highest resident satisfaction rates for the overall quality of city services, 94 percent, according to the 2020 DirectionFinder® citizen survey.

The 2022 budget continues funding residents' highest priorities, such as traffic management, maintenance of City streets, and public safety.

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

CATHEDRAL BUILDER AWARD HONORS FORMER MAYOR COPELAND



YOUR 2022 CITY OF OLATHE BUDGET

The Budget and Capital Improvement Plan reflect community priorities.

Efficient and Effective Measures

Providing City services efficiently and effectively is central to the 2022 Olathe budget. In 2022, the Olathe Fire Department will add another squad unit for emergency response during peak response times. Squads, comprised of a firefighter and a paramedic, increase efficiency and cost-effectiveness for meeting the growing demands for medical calls.




Continued investments in street preservation provide future cost savings and effectively increase the lifespan of Olathe's street network. In 2022, approximately 64 lane miles of mill and overlay and 70 lane miles of surface treatment are planned to maintain streets.

Leveraging outside funding sources to take dollars farther produces more benefits for Olatheans. Successful grant awards help fund projects, such as the \$10 million federal grant for the 119th Street and I-35 Interchange project. Johnson County assists funding by contributing \$6.9 million for street improvements through the County Assisted Road System and \$11.7 million for stormwater projects for 2022-2026 capital projects.

Olathe has an eye for the future by preparing for economic unknowns. The City Council has set the goal of maintaining 30 percent of revenues as reserves to ensure financial stability. Olathe's mill levy remains stable for 2022, demanding efficiency in allocating budget resources.

How Funds are Used

Most of the general fund supports the employees who provide City services – the police officers, firefighters, parks and recreation staff, accountants, street crews, IT staff, and many others. It also includes tools to increase job performance such as computers, software, and continuous training and development. Plus, it funds heating and cooling of public



safety facilities and fuel for police cars and fire trucks. Olathe champions employee health and is consistently recognized for its wellness programs.

Individual Funds Track Other Services

In addition to the general fund, the budget has other funds accounting for separate activities, including the stormwater fund, solid waste fund, and water and sewer fund. Modest residential fee increases are included for 2022 to avoid larger future increases: 2 percent for stormwater and solid waste, 4.9 percent for sewer, and 4.3 percent for water. Olathe utilities fees continue to be some of the lowest in Johnson County.

Capital Projects

Olathe's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a five-year planning and fiscal management tool that identifies available project funding and a timeline. Improved streets, a new state-of-the-art downtown Olathe Public Library, trails, and improved Police and Fire Department facilities are among the projects in the CIP, approved during the budget process.

CIP Highlights

- Santa Fe Street, preliminary engineering for Ridgeview to Mur-Len improvements
- Water and sanitary sewer line rehabilitation

WHAT'S BEING BUILT IN OLATHE

NEW HORIZON ACADEMY

New Horizon Academy, based out of Minnesota, is bringing its early education and childcare program to the shops near Hy-Vee, 151st Street and Black Bob Road. There will be 11 classrooms in the new 13,853 square foot building. New Horizon Academy will begin construction in early 2022 and anticipates opening by fall 2022.



GARMIN INVESTS FURTHER IN OLATHE

Garmin has purchased 193 acres at the northwest corner of 151st Street, Interstate 35 and Highway 169 in Olathe. The acquisition includes a large parcel that previously housed the Great Mall of the Great Plains. Mayor John Bacon made the announcement about Garmin's investment at the 2021 State of the City event.

"This land acquisition gives us the ability to grow our facilities and workforce in the City of Olathe and the State of Kansas for decades to come," says Garmin CEO Cliff Pemble. GARMIN

Garmin currently employs more than 4,300 people in Olathe and 18,000 globally.

MAHAFFIE WINS HUMANITIES KANSAS GRANT

Humanities Kansas recently awarded Mahaffie Stagecoach Stop & Farm Historic Site a \$12,025 Sustaining the Humanities through the American Rescue Plan (SHARP) Recovery Grant. The grant funds will be used to renovate and upgrade exhibits and the visitor orientation film in the Mahaffie Heritage Center.

The SHARP Recovery Grants support Kansas cultural organizations that provide humanities programming. Humanities Kansas awarded 121 SHARP grants statewide, made available through the National Endowment for the Humanities to assist cultural institutions affected by the coronavirus as part of the 2021 American Rescue Plan Act.

Mahaffie Stagecoach Stop & Farm was originally established on the Santa Fe Trail in 1858 and the stone farmhouse that still stands was built in 1865. Mahaffie is the only remaining stagecoach stop on the Santa Fe Trail preserved as a public museum.

SAFETY IS OLATHE'S SNOW REMOVAL FOCUS

When winter weather arrives, crews first work to treat and remove ice and snow on the main roads to ensure emergency responders can reach all areas of Olathe. Then they move to residential streets and cul-de-sacs. This is an enormous job with 1,311 lane miles and 1,428 cul-de-sacs plowed during each snow event.

You can help crews with snow removal by:

Parking vehicles in the driveway, if possible, making sure no part of the vehicle extends into the street.

Shoveling the sidewalk adjacent to your property.

Avoid shoveling driveway snow into the street. Instead, shovel snow to the downstreet side (downstreet is the direction traffic flows past your driveway) to minimize snow buildup at the bottom of the driveway.

PREVENT FROZEN PIPES

When the outside temperatures dip to 20°F and lower, be aware of the possibility of frozen pipes. Most at-risk areas are pipes located against your home's outside walls and in unheated spaces, such as a garage.

Prevention Tips

Open cabinet doors that lead to exposed pipes to allow circulation of warmer household air.

Let water run in a very slow drip from a faucet farthest away from the water's entrance to the

Keep garage doors closed. Plumbing routed through unheated space leaves it vulnerable to

Install pipe insulation products to exposed pipes, such as a "pipe sleeve," or UL-listed "heat tape," "heat cable," or similar products.

Set your thermostat above 65°F when away from your home or business for several days.

My Pipes Froze. Now What?

Safely thaw the pipes as soon as possible or call a plumber.

If you're thawing the pipes, shut off the water. Know where your master water shut off is before an emergency and the need to thaw pipes.

Starting near the faucet end, slowly apply heat with the faucet open and work toward the coldest section. Slower is better.

A hair dryer is appropriate for the job. Not a blow torch. To avoid electrocution, don't use electrical appliances while standing in water.

Check other faucets around your home for additional frozen pipes.
