

OLATHECONNECT JUST GOT BETTER

Residents can now access an all-new OlatheConnect system designed to provide a more streamlined and efficient communication experience for all users.

The new OlatheConnect provides residents, businesses, and visitors a virtual City Hall, giving them the opportunity to access City Hall, 24-hours a day, 7-days a week, from a computer, mobile device, and in the comfort of their own home. In 2023, OlatheConnect users made more than 4,000 submissions to City Hall.

With OlatheConnect users can submit questions, requests, concerns, and

more across dozens of topics requests throughout the City's operations. A pull down menu offers quick access to the most requested topics.

Users will need to create an account to access the new OlatheConnect, giving them more ability to track open requests and previous requests that have been closed

Please note: OlatheConnect is not for emergencies. Please use 911. Requests are not monitored on a 24/7 basis.

OLATHE RESIDENTS DIVERT FOOD WASTE FROM LANDFILL

During 2023, 2,868 residents participated in Olathe's newest recycling program. Through the concerted efforts of residents, they diverted **38,220 pounds of food waste** from landfills.

The food waste drop-off is open to all Olathe residents at the Olathe Community Recycling Center, 1100 N. Hedge Lane. **TIP:** Bring your photo ID, since the Food Waste program is currently open only to Olathe residents.

HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMS AVAILABLE

The City of Olathe provides several housing assistance programs for eligible residents. Each program has specific policies and application procedures to ensure effective assistance to those in need.

The **Housing Rehabilitation Program** offers incomequalified homeowners interest-free, zero percent deferred loans for major home repairs. Deferred loans do not require monthly payments and are only repaid when the property is sold, the title transfers, or there is a change in property use.

The Critical Home Repair Grant Program addresses health

and safety concerns by offering grants to income-eligible homeowners for essential repairs such as collapsed sewers, damaged roofs, or faulty furnaces.

Exterior maintenance issues identified through the Community Enhancement Program can also be addressed.

The **Accessibility Modification Program** provides grants for income-eligible homeowners with physical limitations to remove structural barriers from their homes.

BLACK BOB ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

Black Bob Road improvements are substantially complete from 135th Street to 151st Street. In addition to new pavement surface, new traffic signals were added at 138th Street, right turn lanes were added in all directions at 138th Street, and a southbound right turn lane was added at 139th Street. Other improvements include:

- Asphalt base repair
- Concrete curb and gutter replacement
- Sidewalk and ADA ramp replacements
- Stormwater improvements
- Signal detection improvements
- Pavement marking placements
- Median modifications at 146th Terrace.
